

You may have already heard about the green folders, which are being left in the homes of patients wanting volunteer support. In these folders are blank patient progress note forms that we ask all volunteer caregivers to fill out for each visit they have with a patient. The easiest thing to do is to fill a progress note out towards the end of your visit and put it back inside the folder. A nurse will bring the completed form to the office where it will go into the patient's chart. These notes are an important way of communicating how your visit went with your patient and also tracking how many volunteer hours are spent in care giving. Medicare mandates that five percent of the care our patients receive must be done by volunteers. Also, in the folders you will find time sheets to take, if you need one. Keeping track of your volunteer hours and turning them in on a monthly basis is crucial to keeping accurate volunteer data that is used for reports as well as grant proposals and again, fulfilling Medicare requirements. Envelopes are also in the green folder so that you may snail mail your time sheets or progress notes, if you wish. Mahalo for faithfully doing your paperwork! It is an important aspect of what we all do at NHH.
