WHO'S ON BOARD Susan Hunt

Susan Hunt was born and raised in a small farming community in rural Northern Illinois where her family has farmed since the early 1900s. She attended Southern Illinois University at

Carbondale where she received her bachelor's degree in psychology with an emphasis in organizational behavior. She received her master's degree in health administration from St. Louis University's School of Public Health – St. Louis, Missouri. Following graduation, she was employed at Intermountain Health Care in Salt Lake City, Utah, until moving to Hawaii in 1991.

Susan has held various administrative positions at local hospitals and clinics including Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children, Hamakua Health Center, and North Hawaii Community Hospital. She has



extensive non-profit management, program development, and leadership experience. NEW FACES AT HOSPICE Jennifer Rabalais, RN, CIC

Jennifer Rabalais joined our team as a hospice nurse and community educator this past year.

Jennifer was born in a small town in Louisiana called Cottonport because it had a hospital and was a bigger town than the town where her parents lived. She lived in rural Louisiana for five years until she moved to the big city of Baton Rouge where she lived until she was 18. Jennifer was always interested in science and medicine and thought nurses were really great so she decided to leave during her lunch hour at a boring clerical job and walk across the street to the hospital and apply to the nursing school there. It was the Lady of the Lake Hospital School of Nursing in Baton Rouge.

In nursing school in the 1970s, hospice nursing as an institution was in its infancy. Jennifer learned about Brompton's cocktail (a pain cocktail used in the first hospices in England) and the very basics of hospice nursing and she became intrigued. Then, while working as a home infusion nurse in the SF Bay area in the early 1990's, she cared for many people with HIV/AIDS and collaborated with hospices. That's where she learned a lot about hospice and was very interested

Since starting work at North Hawaii Hospice, Jennifer says she enjoys getting to know the



patients and their families and being able to make a real difference for them all during a very

difficult time. She feels it is an honor to be part of someone's journey at the end of life.

Jennifer has been married to her marine biologist husband for almost 38 years. He is from St. Croix, in the Virgin Islands. She met him when she traveled there as a traveling nurse. They do not have children but enjoy extended families--siblings, nieces, and nephews. Her mom and sister still live in Louisiana and her husband's remaining family are now mostly in Costa Rica.

Last year, she traveled to Roatan, Honduras, and visited her husband's Costa Rican family.

She and her husband love hiking, paddling, snorkeling, bird-watching, and photography. They've traveled to many places and some of their favorites were snorkeling in Palau, traveling New Zealand by camper van, and diving in Fiji.

Her favorite things about living on Hawaii Island include the incredible contrast between blue sky, black lava, and blue ocean; watching the amazing sunsets from where they live; enjoying the majesty of the volcano; spontaneous music at patients' homes; and the hugs she gets from patients and their families.



Did You Know?

Did you know that North Hawaii Hospice's services are offered free of charge to our patients and their families? North Hawaii Hospice is dedicated to making hospice care a possibility for all people, regardless of their economic situation.

While working in the hospital as a Medical Surgical nurse, she found that she was really drawn toward working with terminally ill patients and seemed to have a good connection with them so decided that hospice nursing was something she'd like to pursue. Monica particularly appreciates the more holistic approach of valuing the emotional,

spiritual, and psychological needs of hospice patients as well as their physical needs, and values working as part of a team to provide hospice care.
